Introducing new staff member - Kyle Townsend

I am a long-term resident of the Great Southern with a background in Conservation Biology and Environmental Sciences, specialising in plant genetics, the effects of fire, spatial information and environmental management. I was formerly involved with South Coast Natural Resource Management as an employee and volunteer (something I have a long and varied history as) where I primarily delivered on mapping projects and technical reports. I have a strong background in research and am currently studying Climate Change policy, focusing on how to effectively communicate policy to the public and how to communicate policy requirements to policymakers.

In this role I understand that the environment and agriculture exist together in a landscape: they are not separate entities and we need both to be productive and healthy in order to live, work and recreate. We need to have a sustainable approach to both, which includes increasing yields, supporting the community, and managing the environment. I look forward to working with many of you and getting to know what you do, how you do it, who you are and what you need from us to help you achieve the goals that we share.

## Annual fox shoot and community breakfast

The fox shoot this year consisted of five registered teams across various properties in the Shire of Gnowangerup. Licensed gun owners went out on Friday the 12<sup>th</sup> and some continued until 6 am the next morning when we counted the kill at the Ongerup tip.

Foxes, cats and other invasive fauna are having a devastating impact on the region's wildlife species populations and biodiversity. In conjunction with other control mechanisms, such as 1080 baiting, the annual fox shoot aims to control pest numbers and reduce pressure on our native fauna as well as lambing costs to farmers. Foxes are estimated to cost farmers \$35 million annually throughout lambing periods. Toxoplasmosis is a parasite that can be transferred from feral cats to pregnant ewes, potentially causing embryonic fatalities and miscarriages.

Not only is the annual fox shoot beneficial both economically and environmentally but it is a great excuse to get together with some mates and catch up with other community members at the Yongergnow pre-seeding community breakfast.

The kill totals were: Foxes: 112 Cats: 2 Rabbits: 20

The winning team was the 'Toompup Terrorizers' with 37 foxes and 7 rabbits. Great job!


#### Water management workshop

NSPNR recently hosted a water management workshop at the Borden Pavilion which was followed by a visit to view sub-surface drainage at a farm west of Cranbrook.

Prue Batchelor's take-home message: Long-term best practice water management means working with salt in the landscape rather than against it. Use a lot of small-scale

interventions to make the landscape work for you for long-term productivity. Mitigating rising salinity issues is about vegetation and smart planting.

An innovative idea was the Hexa-cover Floating Cover for dams and reservoirs. It consists of many six-sided disks that fit together. A truckload of disks is simply tipped into the dam and they spread out to float on the surface. The cover reduces evaporation, reduces sunlight so reducing algal growth, and discourages waterfowl from landing so reducing *E. coli* contamination of the water. Hexa-cover disks have even been used in water troughs and cattle simply nose the units out of the way to access the water.



The installation of the pipe for subsurface drainage by Drainage Downunder required a significant bit of gear!

## Feral control at Monjebup

NSPNR staff were recently invited by Bush Heritage Australia to attend a project launch at the **Michael Tichbon Field Station at Red Moort Reserve (Monjebup)** to mark the commencement of the five-year Fitz-Stirling Fauna Recovery Project.

The Fitz-Stirling Fauna Recovery Project, funded through the support of Lotterywest, aims to protect and enhance native fauna in the region through the management of cats, foxes and rabbits throughout an area of over 37 000 hectares in the heart of the Fitz-Stirling landscape. This will be delivered through a long-term, coordinated baiting program across multiple private landholdings at a landscape scale, enhancing the existing predator baiting program delivered by Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions at the Corackerup and Peniup Nature Reserves.

This was the start of an important and transformational project that could see the recovery of many important species in the region including the honey possum, western pygmy possum, tammar and black-gloved wallabies and the malleefowl among others.



We wish Bush Heritage Australia well with their project.

Secure your baits. While goannas have tolerance to 1080 in fox baits, if they access and remove baits it reduces the effectiveness of a baiting program. Meat baits should be tethered by a length of light wire or similar to prevent them being moved.


