We are proud to live and work on Goreng Country in the Noongar nation. As we go about our purpose to inspire and support the North Stirlings Pallinup community to preserve and improve the region's natural resources, we acknowledge that the traditional custodians have walked these lands for many years before us and carry immeasurable knowledge. We pay our ongoing respects to the Elders of the past, the Elders we work and talk with in the present, and the emerging Elders with whom we begin to forge friendships, collaborations and a culture of mutual respect.

Welcoming Birak 🌸 (December – January)

The Noongar Season 'Birak' is associated with the colour red, symbolising heat, sun, and fire, and it is a significant month in the Noongar calendar, particularly for farmers. During this season, rainfall diminishes, and warm weather takes a firm grip. Sea breeze from the southwest provides relief in the afternoons. For farmers, this period demands careful planning and resource management as they navigate the challenges of reduced water availability and heightened temperatures.

Birak witnesses the emergence of numerous fledglings, with some, like magpies and parrots, remaining close to their parents. Reptiles undergo skin shedding, and rising temperatures, coupled with reduced rainfall, mark a crucial period for baby frogs as they complete their transformation into adulthood. Traditionally, Birak was the fire season for the Noongar people. Consistent easterly winds in the morning and sea breezes in the afternoon created optimal conditions for controlled burns in mosaic patterns across the landscape. This practice served multiple purposes, including fuel reduction, enhancing grazing pastures, aiding seed germination, and facilitating ease of movement across the country.

### A message from the committee

I hope this newsletter finds you finished or close to the finish of harvest if you are farming, and if not, winding up another busy year of school or business. It has been a busy and fulfilling year for the executive management committee, with two semi newbies in Rebecca O'Meehan and myself, and a 'new' newbie in Peter Callaghan joining us as Vice Chair at our recent AGM. We've been getting stuck into the business of natural resource management, sustainable agriculture and all that goes with this very broad environmental brushstroke. Kevin Wise remains as the long-standing guru of all things NRM and Vanessa Stone has just completed a second splendid year!

As you may or may not be aware, much of our core funding comes through our regional organisation, South Coast NRM Inc. South Coast NRM is one of a collective of 54 natural resource management organisations covering the whole of Australia. These organisations are the disseminators of federal government funding allocations in the NRM/Agriculture space across the nation.

NSPNR relies heavily on this funding to be able to facilitate and implement vital projects in our catchment area. There has been a disappointing delay by the federal government in the announcement of the latest phase of Regional Land Partnerships. We, along with all South Coast NRM and other community groups in the South Coast region, are critically affected by this gap in ongoing funds in terms of resources for staffing, administration and on-ground works.

This delay, however, has given us the opportunity to undertake an organisational review. We will analyse our current structure — committee, reference group and staff — and our operating model so that we continue to meet the evolving shape of our community in terms of volunteer capacity to run NSPNR, delivering what our members want and keeping hold of the community capacity building aspect of NSPNR that is vitally important, but often overlooked.

This review will not just be about assessing where we are now, it will be about clarifying where we want to be. NSPNR has always been committed to working passionately and hard towards achieving healthy, productive, prosperous landscapes and communities, and kudos must be given to all the past volunteer committee members and staff who have committed so much time and effort to this, but the time is ripe to evaluate our performance and identify areas where we can elevate our delivery.

Our end goal is clear: to emerge from this review as a stronger, more efficient and effective organisation that continues to make a difference in the health and sustainability of our landscape, businesses and communities. Our hope is that other community not-for-profit organisations will be encouraged by our desire to "be the change we want to see in the world" and will be inspired to also take a critical look at the way their organisation operates in today's world... we are all perhaps guilty of sticking with traditional structures and not being mindful that each generation has their own set of values and priorities and committees must be adaptive enough to find the most effective pathway forward. So - watch this space!

We want to hear from you. Your perspectives are invaluable as we assess our future direction and identify opportunities for improvement. NSPNR exists because of and for its members, so we encourage you to actively participate in this process. # NSPNR and Yongergnow partner to hold feral event

NSPNR has partnered with Yongergnow Australian Malleefowl Centre to hold a Feral Animal Tally and Community Breakfast on Saturday 17 February 2024. Registered teams may start targeting foxes, feral cats and rabbits on private land in the Shire of Gnowangerup and Gnowellen and Broomehill East from 5pm the night before.

Team members are to arrive with their collection at either of two locations, Ongerup Tip or Gnowangerup Tip, between 5.30am and 6am. Tally starts at 6am. Late entries will not be considered for the tally.

The event is part of NSPNR's project, "Expanded predator control program in the Fitz-Stirling Corridor", that aims to reduce the number of feral cats, foxes and rabbits in the area between the Stirling Range and Fitzgerald River national parks. This will reduce pressure on native animals including malleefowl, chuditch and Carnaby's black cockatoo. This project is supported by funding from the Western Australian Government's State NRM Program.

Foxes, cats and other invasive fauna have a devastating impact on the numbers and biodiversity of wildlife species in the North Stirlings - Pallinup subregion and across the country. In Australia, cats and foxes were found to collectively kill more than 1.4 billion mammals, almost 700 million reptiles and around 510 million birds each year. Foxes are estimated to cost Australian farmers \$35 million dollars annually throughout lambing periods. Toxoplasmosis is a parasite that can be transferred from feral cats to pregnant ewes, potentially causing embryonic fatalities and miscarriages. Rabbits cause an estimated \$600 million worth of damage to Australian agriculture each year.

Community members are warmly invited to attend the breakfast from 6.30am (Yongergnow Centre or Soul Van opposite Gnowangerup Post Office) to hear the results of the tally. Free soil carbon sampling \*apply now\*

Free soil coring and analysis of soil carbon is being offered to 40 farms in WA, as part of the Federal Government's National Soil Carbon Innovation Challenge. This aims at developing technologies that will lower the current costs of accurately baselining a farm's soil carbon. The project will cover the costs of the soil sampling & lab tests – typically costing around \$5000-\$7000. The program is seeking farms that have varied land management practices on the same farm, (for example Cropping Vs Pasture, OR Planted to wheat last season Vs Planted to canola last season).
