David Thompson, Moojepin Foods, talked about the saline foods he produces and how they've marketed this produce to restaurants around Australia. This has allowed David to diversify his income from land that was otherwise unproductive in the traditional broadacre farming sense.



Wonders of the Warperup event



What a way to wrap up the 3 year Waterways Restoration Project. On Friday the 18th of November NSPNR and the local community celebrated the Warperup creek and catchment with games, workshops, activities, presentations and more!

Families were welcomed to the event with Goreng elder Ezzard Flowers who spent time teaching the young ones some Noongar language and the importance of the local Bilya (rivers) to the Goreng peoples. Kids were also treated to a boomerang-throwing workshop from Uncle Ezzard. There were some brilliant boomerang throwers and we managed to get to the end of the workshop with no black eyes, and only very happy smiling faces.

Kids got their hands wet with the River Model and learnt more about how rivers are formed and what can affect the health of a waterway. Many "trees" were planted in the model which was great to see!





Families were able to not only learn about exactly what is living in the Warperup creek but see the macro invertebrates and fish with an interactive display from Steve and Geraldine Janicke. Steve and Geraldine have been working on the river systems in the South-west for 30 years, and have been carrying out the monitoring, research, and reporting aspects of this project. Steve and Geraldine presented their findings from the last 3 years which was very informative and thought-provoking. Did you know that although the named creek is 72km long, if you were to add up all the tributaries in the catchment that feed into the Warperup Creek you get a whopping 1064km!!

To finish up the evening kids enjoyed watching "The Lorax" up on the big screen and eating popcorn, while the adults were able to treat themselves to a delicious feed from The Soul Van.

NSPNR congratulates Luke on his new role.



Explore surface-water flow and accumulation



The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) has developed an interactive map allowing you to explore surface water flow and accumulation within the South West agricultural region. This map can inform the placement of new dams and the risk of dryland salinity at potential dam locations.

Included in the Hydro Guide map is

- Surface water flowlines
- Existing dams and lakes
- Contour lines
- Slope
- Potential inundation
- Roaded catchment dams
- Dryland salinity
- Potential salinity risk
- Rocky outcrops

Please note, the map is intended as a guide only. As the map is derived from modelling based on various sources there may be some inherent errors.

DPIRD has a new podcast series, Grains Convo. These short podcasts aim to assist grain growers by delving deeper into DPIRD research projects that target crop protection, crop production, soils and genetics in broadacre crops. Grains Convo is published twice a month and December's topics are:

- 1. Crop simulation modelling to understand constraints
- 2. 2023 WA Crop Sowing Guide
- 3. Minimising harvest losses
